Objectives

The charity's public benefit objectives, following guidance from the Charity Commission, are contained in its Constitution and are:

- For the benefit of the inhabitants of the surrounding area of Cotteridge Park and visitors to the area ("the beneficiaries")
- The promotion of the provision of facilities for the education, recreation and other leisure time occupation in the interests of social welfare with he object of improving the conditions of life for the beneficiaries without the distinction of sex or of political, religious or other opinions in particular but not exclusively by:
- a. The promotion, support and improvement of Cotteridge Park
- b. Organising programmes of physical, educational, creative and other activities on the interests of social welfare, primarily in and around the park.



2022 - the year after the pandemic

Like many community groups 2022 was the year we were able to get back to something like normal.

CoCoMAD came back and lots of our regular activity sessions could settle back to their usual routine, offering opportunities for improving our community's physical and mental wellbeing.

As a result of the pandemic even more people had got the "going to the park" habit and Cotteridge Park and its volunteers were ready to welcome them.

Thanks to the generosity of the volunteers The Shed is open 7 days a week running a busy programme of activities benefiting the physical and mental wellbeing of our community.

- Knitting, painting, crafts and woodcarving
- Zumba, yoga, dance and Tai Chi
- Walking and running groups
- Social groups for older people
- Pay-as-you-feel homemade soup lunches

These sessions are only possible thanks to the support of our kind funders and the generous contributions of the people who visit the park.

All the income generated by The Shed goes into providing services for the community.

The Shed also provides a place for a drink and very important access to toilets

The Shed Volunteers

From opening on Christmas Day (in case anyone is on their own at home), to training young (and older) people in barista and front-of-house skills The Shed is here for our community.

We are really proud of the training and work experience we are able to offer. Many have started at The Shed and gone on to use their new skills to find paid work.

Our oldest volunteers are in the 70s and 80s, our youngest Shed volunteers are 14.




















CoCoMAD and other events in 2022

Lifting of restrictions enabled lots of our activities to return:


This included a programme of forest school sessions for families, pre-schoolers and with local schools and youth organisations.

And we have been delighted to host the returning young conservation volunteers back after the covid break.







Future Plans

For 2023 there are a number of plans we want to put into action

- Refurbishment of the playing courts area so that they meet the needs of the local community – particularly the increasing number of young people using the courts to play basketball and Bike Polo
- Development of more services for young people. Post covid we hope to bring back the volunteer programmes with local schools
- A review of the management plan for the stream in the park to deal with the erosion of the banks and to increase the health of the stream for wildlife and learning.
- Look to employ a full-time Shed manager so we can offer more services for our community




Image: One of the many poems contributed to Cotteridge Park by our local poet.

Financial Review

Financial review

Income and expenditure for 2022 was in line with budgets.

We were successful in obtaining grants which enabled FoCP to continue to provide activities for free for the benefit of the local community.

The accounting software introduced last year has helped make budgetary management more efficient.

Reserves and reserves policy

Trustees consider that in the current uncertain climate, and in particular the continued reductions in funding for parks and 'softer' social activities, that excluding costs associated with the annual CoCoMAD festival, the charity should aim to hold an unrestricted reserve equivalent to a minimum of 3 months running/delivery costs for park activities and general running costs.

Unrestricted cash funds at the end of 2022 stand at £51K which trustees consider to be in line with the above intent. A further £31k is held in restricted funds for projects to continue in 2023.

Although the capital spending on The Shed is complete there is a continued need to focus on grants and donations to fund activities that will benefit the local community.

We expect The Shed will continue to generate income to help support activities in the park but some of the income will need to be set aside for repairs and maintenance for the building.

This year's budget has been drawn up to enable trustees to monitor spend against our plans. This takes into account additional financial responsibilities in running a building such as cleaning and catering supplies, electricity, repairs, and maintenance.

Structure and Governance

The Friends of Cotteridge Park CIO is a membership organisation for those who enjoy and use Cotteridge Park and was registered as a charity on 21 January 2019. It began its activities on 1 June 2019 following the transfer of funds from the old charity.

The Trustees were appointed on registration, represent the members, and manage the business of the charity on their behalf. The charity has no employees and is run entirely by volunteers.

The charity holds regular management meetings open to all members, and quarterly Trustee meetings.

Independent Examiners Report

Notes to the accounts - Restricted Funding for 2022

CoCoMad

Funding from the Royal Society of Chemistry Outreach Fund to fund the Community Festival.

Together for the Planet

Funding from National Lottery Community Fund towards certain activities at the CoCoMAD Community Festival.

Youth Workers in Cotteridge Park

Funding from Cotteridge Quaker Meeting and supporting an application to Awards for All with Friends of Bournville Park. Some funding also re-directed, with permission from the funder, from a storytelling project that had to be cancelled because of the pandemic

Cinema Project - funding from BFI

Shed Soup - Funding from the Eveson Charitable Trust towards the delivery of a weekly lunch club for the over 50's at the Shed.

Couch to £5k - Funding from Sport England to get people active in the Midlands.

SprayArt Graffiti - Funding from the Queens Platinum Jubilee Fund for Spray-Art Graffiti Workshops for Young People.

Forest Schools - Funding from the National Lottery Awards for All and Cotteridge Quaker Meeting towards Family Forest Schools.

Commonwealth Games - Funding from Birmingham City Council for Celebrating Communities at the CoCoMAD Community Festival.

Woodcarving - Funding from the D'Oyly Carte Charitable Trust towards the provision of weekly Woodcarving for Mental Wellbeing Sessions in 2022/23

Warm Sessions in the Shed - Funding from National Grid to provide Community Activities in the Shed.
